Policy Statement

All students of the University of Minnesota Medical School (UMMS) are expected to maintain continuous enrollment and meet the academic, technical, and professional standards for advancement and graduation within a prescribed time frame, with or without accommodations.

This policy clarifies the single set of core requirements governing what constitutes satisfactory academic progress for advancement and graduation. For students receiving financial aid, federal regulations require the UMMS to establish, publish, and apply standards to monitor progress toward completion of the MD degree.

Curriculum Sequencing

- **Foundations Phase (FP):** The Foundations Phase consists of a total of three semesters in Year 1 (fall: FP1, spring: FP2, and summer: FP3), and a single fall semester in Year 2 (FP4). *
- **Clinical Immersion Phase (CiP) and Specialty-Specific Transitions Phase (StP):** The Clinical Immersion Phase (CiP) and the Specialty-Specific Transition Phase (StP) consist of a total of seven semesters beginning in the spring of Year 2 through the spring of Year 4. *
 - **USMLE Step 1:** Upon the completion of the FP, students are afforded dedicated study time during the first semester of the CiP to prepare for USMLE Step 1.

Procedures

I. Requirements

1. Foundations Phase (FP)

² In the rare instance there are both unremediated failures/Incompletes in FP1-4 courses *and* a failure of USMLE Step 1, the student will be referred to COSSS for review and consideration regarding the impact on academic progress.

2. Clinical Immersion Phase (CiP) and Specialty-Specific Transitions Phase (StP)

- a. To successfully meet the requirements of the CiP and StP, students must:
 - i. pass all required core clerkships, selectives, and acting internships
 - ii. fulfill all required weeks of electives, including “hands on” elective weeks
 - iii. achieve entrustment at a level of indirect supervision for Core EPAs 1, 2, 5, and 6
 - iv. take and meet established performance levels (eg. pass), all required institutional assessments as designated in the MD Program requirements

3. All Phases

- a. Students must successfully pass the USMLE Step 1 and Step 2 CK as described below.
- b. Students must meet compliance requirements as outlined in the **Student Compliance Requirements, Years 1-4** policy (see “*Related Information*”, below).
- c. Students must meet the academic, technical, professional, and competency standards at each level of the medical education program and at the time of graduation. This includes successfully completing all remediation plans and resolving all Incomplete

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4. Time Limits

Students are expected to complete the UMMS undergraduate medical education program within the four-year curricular format. In rare instances students may be approved for additional time, such as when decelerating or engaging in remedial activities. In these instances, the maximum duration for completion of undergraduate medical education is six years from matriculation:

- a. Students enrolled in a dual degree program are granted additional time as long as they otherwise remain in good academic standing in the medical school.
- b. Approved Leaves of Absence (LOA) are not counted against time to completion.

II. Graduation

Medical students must meet the following requirements to be awarded the MD degree.

- a. Successfully completing all requirements of the medical education program within prescribed time limits
- a. Achievement of all Graduation Competencies
- b. Achievement of all required core EPAs
- c. Successfully passed the United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE) Step 1 and Step 2 Clinical Knowledge (CK). Passing standards are those established by the National Board of Medical Examiners (NBME).
- b. Be in Good Academic Standing at the time of graduation

III. Systematic Progression

1. Academic Difficulty

Refers to failing and/or performing marginally on one or more graded *components* within a course/clerkship, *prior* to receiving a final grade for the course/clerkship. In these instances, students are strongly encouraged to proactively seek out services to support their academic success. It is ultimately each student's responsibility to be engaged in, and take responsibility for, their own education and for availing themselves of academic resources.

2. At Risk

A student is considered "At Risk" inclusive of, but not limited to:

- students who receive a failing grade (N) in any one FP, CiP, or StP course in a given term with no other previous, current, or outstanding academic failures or professional deficiencies, or;
- students who fail their first attempt on USMLE Step 1 or Step 2 CK with no other previous, current, or outstanding academic failures or professional deficiencies

Students At Risk will meet with an Academic Advisor, and/or the Dean of Students for their campus to develop an appropriate and detailed remediation plan.

3. Academic Probation

This refers to students with continuing and/or more serious deficiencies. Probation is noted in the student's academic record and the Medical Student Performance Evaluation (MSPE) and the student is no longer in Good Academic Standing. Factors resulting in probationary status include the following:

- a. Failing a **repeat** of an FP or clerkship course (see "*Definitions*").

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- b. Failing a **re-examination** of an FP exam (see “*Definitions*”).
- c. Failing to meet the requirements of a remediation plan.
- d. A second failure in any combination of FP courses, CiP, or StP courses, or USMLE Step Exams whether previously remediated or currently unremediated.
- e. Being sanctioned for a significant or persistent professionalism or behavioral violation (see “*Related Information*”).

4. Academic Dismissal

A student will be subject to a dismissal hearing for the following reasons, including but not limited to:

- a. Having three or more failures in any combination of Foundations or clerkship courses, and/or USMLE exams (Step 1, Step 2 CK) whether remediated or unremediated.
- b. Failing USMLE Step 1 or Step 2 CK three times (see “*USMLE Requirements*”).
- c. Failing to remediate academic probation.
- d. Egregious or repeated violations of professional standards in academic, clinical, or other related professional settings.
- e. Egregious or repeated violations of the University’s Code of Conduct (see “*Related Information*”).
- f. Failing to adhere to the *Time Limits for Completion of Coursework and Awarding of the MD* as outlined herein.

COSSS: Students on Academic Probation, facing Dismissal, or who meet the criteria limiting progression will be referred to the Committee on Student Scholastic Standing (COSSS).

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Definitions

Re-examination: A re-examination refers to instances in which a student must retake a specific graded examination/activity as part of a formal remediation plan implemented through an advisor or scholastic standing committee.

Repeat: A repeat refers to instances in which a student must retake the entire course/clerkship.

Satisfactory Academic Progress: Satisfactory academic progress is the appropriate successful completion of degree requirements according to established increments that lead to degree completion within published completion limits.

LCME Accreditation Relevance

This policy ensures the medical school meets LCME Accreditation requirements as follows:

Element 9.9: STUDENT ADVANCEMENT AND APPEAL PROCESS. “A medical school ensures that the medical education program has a single set of core standards for the advancement and graduation of all medical students across all locations. A subset of medical students may have academic requirements in addition to the core standards if they are enrolled in a parallel curriculum. A medical school ensures that there is a fair and formal process for taking any action that may affect the status of a medical student, including timely notice of the impending action, disclosure of the evidence on which the action would be based, an opportunity for the medical student to respond, and an opportunity to appeal any adverse decision related to advancement, graduation, or dismissal.”

Element 10.3: POLICIES REGARDING STUDENT SELECTION/PROGRESS AND THEIR DISSEMINATION. “The faculty of a medical school establish criteria for student selection and develop and implement effective policies and procedures regarding, and make decisions about, medical student application, selection, admission, assessment, promotion, graduation, and any disciplinary action. The medical school makes available to all interested parties its criteria, standards, policies, and procedures regarding these matters.”
